WHAT MAKES THINGS FUNNY?

Millenia of little study & bullshit theories

* **Greeks + Early Christians** disliked it
↳ no laughter in monasteries

↳ **Erasmus**: in praise of folly, Renaissance wit

* **SUPERIORITY THEORY** **Hobbes + Scruton**

↳ laughter as superiority

* **RELIEF THEORY** **Spencer + Freud**

↳ excess of spirit bubbles up as laughter

* **INCONGRUITY THEORY** **Kant**

↳ "transformation from strained expectation to nothing"



Humor =

HUMOR

Simultaneous appreciation of the benign + violating features

Examples

• Ticking: Violation of personal space

BUT only funny if someone you trust is tickling you
∴ must be both violation and benign.

• Getting a joke, need both benign AND violation immediately, else you won't find it funny.

• Cultural effects. Muhammad cartoons not funny in Saudi, but sex jokes are funnier, they're a bigger violation!



Measured how funny this joke was




Varied over time!

At first "too soon", not benign

THEN (OLD)

Then not a violation, no-one cared

- "I'm not a fan of the new £1 coin, then again, I hate all change"
- "My dad suggested I register for a doctor card, he's a man after my own heart"
- "I needed a password that was eight characters long, so I picked Snow White & the 7 dwarves"

MUMOUR IN NON-HUMAN ANIMALS

* Dolphins Blomqvist et al. 2005

↳ Acoustic whistles during play-fighting
characteristic, never seen in aggressive behaviour

* Monkeys Marsusama 2004

↳ vocalisations during wrestling, play chasing, or hickling

* Rats

↳ 50 kHz sounds during play fighting
though also during mating + heroine ... not laughter?

* Rats "whit is hard" ⇒ stone, work

↳ suspect interpretations, nipple fixation

Why Do We Have A SENSE OF HUMOUR?

⇒ Signaling that a potentially bad situation is fine
Ramachandran 2008

- * Reproductive advantage - Mithens
- * Making you rethink pre-existing structures
↳ chase pleasurable things, humor
- * Ostracism / In-group Out-group

Traditional Societies

* All have humor

* Many have ritual clowns

→ same topics
→ motif

→ ritual clowns

awfully, special
conflict

→ buffer in conflicts

→ mock authority

Big social role: Tanganyika laughter epidemic

* 3 → 95 pupils hours → 16 days School closed - month later

* passed to next village ⇒ 217 more

* 18 months later it died

* 1000 people & 10 schools closed

NEURAL CORRELATES OF HUMOUR?

fMRI

1) Incongruity resolution temporo-occipital-parietal junction

IN = multimodal, involved in self-related processing + theory of mind

2) Emotional valence amygdala + dopamine neurons

Reward related responses ↳ relevance detector!

Electrodes

• SMA electric shock ⇒ mirth + laughter!

• angular bundle ⇒ laughter ↓↓

stimulated with an electrode, people started finding things in the room funny!
